What do you remember most about your time in the Clinic?

Collaboration with my friend and clinic partner Alix Strunk; our weekly meetings with Sioban; and lengthy telephone calls and meetings with our asylum applicant client. I also remember sharing a wall with the death penalty clinic students who were working on Casey Anthony's defense (as exciting as asylum law can be, those kids were doing something pretty exciting too).

What lessons from the clinic do you still use today or have used in your professional career?

Go to the statute first. How to earn a client's trust. How to approach talking to clients about trauma.

How did your involvement with the clinic help you connect with other professionals in the field?

It feels like a family in Chicago among immigration lawyers, because so many Chicago immigration lawyers went to DePaul and were in the clinic. I remember I completed NIJC's online form for a summer internship, and no one had gotten back to me. Linus Chan put a word in for me and, I had an interview right away. We all got to volunteer at Midwest Regional during our year in the clinic, when Sioban, I believe, was the Chapter Chair. My 3L clerk job at Maria Baldini-Potermin's office was advertised through the clinic, and that turned into an attorney job after I graduated.
